


ANNIE GOODRICH, CLASS OF 1892

Goodrich was born into an affluent Connecticut family in in 1866. While little is known about her mother, her character might have been influenced by the notable close associates of her parents.



When she was 23 years old, her business executive father died. Having been exposed to nursing through out her father's illness she decided to enter New York Hospital Training School for Nurses, Class of 1892.

Classmates from the Class of 1892 included Lillian Wald, founder of the Henry Street Settlement







An alliance of Nurse Educators of the early 20th Century, each involved in the formation of the American Nurses Association, National League of Nursing, International Council of Nursing, American Red Cross, Teachers College, Bellevue Hospital, Henry Street Settlement and the American Journal of Nursing included the following nurses:

Annie Goodrich
Isabel Hampton Robb
Lavinia Dock
Mary Adelaide Nutting

Each stressed the social component of health and the need for scientific-based curriculum

1892–1902 St. Luke's Hospital, Graduate Nurse

1902–1907 New York Hospital, Superintendent of Nursing. She establishes a high school diploma as a prerequisite for nursing students

1904 – appointed an assistant professor of hospital economics, Teachers College Columbia University

1907 – Bellevue Hospital, General Superintendent

While continuing to teach at Teacher's College, she became the director of the Henry Street Settlement





1917 America enters World War One

Goodrich becomes the chief nursing inspector of US Army Hospitals. Working with another New York Hospital Training School for Nurses graduate, she organizes the U.S. Army School of Nursing

Dear Miss Goodrich:-


As you know, Yale has decided to establish a University School of Nursing. With the essentials of the program, you are familiar, as I know you have seen the tentative plan submitted by the University to the Rockefeller Foundation. You are also reasonably familiar with the local situation here, so that I need not dwell upon that phase of the matter.


Our first step must be to secure a Dean of the new School who will take charge of the organization of the educational work and I am writing to say that, if you are able to accept the position, I shall nominate you to the Yale Corporation for appointment as Dean of the Yale School of Mursing, at a salary of \$5500. per year, from October 1st, 1925.

Trusting that I may have your prompt acceptance of this proposal and with assurances of my deep interest in the successful launching of this important work, I am,






Yale 1949 Graduating Class
